- Find ways for people with a disability from different cultures, ages and genders to have a say in Community matters

- ✓ Provide Community transport options to people with a disability



What is 'disability'?



There are many different types of disabilities.

These can be the result of:

- accidents
- illness
- genetic disorders

The The South Australian Disability Inclusion Act 2018 defines disability as experiencing long-term:

- physical
- psycho-social
- intellectual
- cognitive
- neurological or sensory impairment, or
- a combination of the above

These impairments can make it difficult for someone to participate fully and equally in the Community.

Social Model of Disability



We promote a social model of disability which views the barriers in society as what hinders people with a disability, not their impairment.

A barrier could be physical, like a building not having an accessible toilet. It could also be people's attitudes and understanding about disabilities.

These barriers need to be removed so that people with a disability can participate equally with others in the Community.

We are committed to Universal Design principles.

This means that something is designed in a way that anyone and everyone can use it, whatever their age or ability is.

Disability Access & Inclusion Advisory Committee

In 2007, we formed what is now called the 'Disability Access & Inclusion Advisory Committee.'

This Committee is made up of people with a disability or who have a lived experience of disability, disability agency representatives, Elected Members and Council staff.

The Committee gives advice to Council on things to do with access and inclusion for people with a disability in the Campbelltown Council area, and offers ideas and solutions.



Our Community includes people who live with disability



In 2016, there were 3,216 people living in the City of Campbelltown who needed help in their day-to-day lives because of disability.

The suburb of Campbelltown had the greatest number of people with a disability, followed by Magill and Paradise.

In 2018/19 there were 640 NDIS participants living in the Campbelltown Council area.


